## Introduction



#### 1.1 Overview



Figure 1-1: TANK-GM45

The TANK-GM45 Series embedded system is a fanless system for wide range temperature environments. It is powered by the Intel® 45nm Core™2 Duo processor, uses the Intel® GM45 chipset and has 2.0 GB of DDR2 memory. The TANK-GM45B in this series is preinstalled with a 32 GB SATA Solid State Disk (SSD) with up to 3Gb/s data transfer rate.




Figure 1-2: TANK-GM45 Peripheral Connectors

All external peripheral interface connectors are located on the front panel of the TANK-GM45. The peripheral interface connectors are shown in **Figure 1-2**.




Figure 1-3: Physical Dimensions (millimeters)

# Unpacking



#### 2.1 Anti-static Precautions



#### WARNING:

Failure to take ESD precautions during installation may result in permanent damage to the TANK-GM45 and severe injury to the user.

Electrostatic discharge (ESD) can cause serious damage to electronic components, including the TANK-GM45. Dry climates are especially susceptible to ESD. It is therefore critical that whenever the TANK-GM45 or any other electrical component is handled, the following anti-static precautions are strictly adhered to.

- Wear an anti-static wristband: Wearing a simple anti-static wristband can help to prevent ESD from damaging the board.
- Self-grounding: Before handling the board touch any grounded conducting material. During the time the board is handled, frequently touch any conducting materials that are connected to the ground.
- Use an anti-static pad: When configuring the TANK-GM45, place it on an antic-static pad. This reduces the possibility of ESD damaging the TANK-GM45.

#### 2.2 Unpacking Precautions

When the TANK-GM45 is unpacked, please do the following:

- Follow the anti-static precautions outlined in Section 2.1.
- Make sure the packing box is facing upwards so the TANK-GM45 does not fall out of the box.
- Make sure all the components shown in **Section 2.3** are present.

## Installation



#### 3.1 Installation Precautions

During installation, be aware of the precautions below:

- Read the user manual: The user manual provides a complete description of the TANK-GM45, installation instructions and configuration options.
- DANGER! Disconnect Power: Power to the TANK-GM45 must be disconnected during the installation process, or before any attempt is made to access the rear panel. Electric shock and personal injury might occur if the rear panel of the TANK-GM45 is opened while the power cord is still connected to an electrical outlet.
- Qualified Personnel: The TANK-GM45 must be installed and operated only
  by trained and qualified personnel. Maintenance, upgrades, or repairs may
  only be carried out by qualified personnel who are familiar with the associated
  dangers.
- Air Circulation: Make sure there is sufficient air circulation when installing the TANK-GM45. The TANK-GM45's cooling vents must not be obstructed by any objects. Blocking the vents can cause overheating of the TANK-GM45. Leave at least 5 cm of clearance around the TANK-GM45 to prevent overheating.
- Grounding: The TANK-GM45 should be properly grounded. The voltage feeds must not be overloaded. Adjust the cabling and provide external overcharge protection per the electrical values indicated on the label attached to the back of the TANK-GM45.

#### 3.2 Hard Disk Drive (HDD) Installation

To install the hard drive, please follow the steps below:




Figure 3-2: Bottom Panel Retention Screws (Bottom Panel)

Step 1: Remove the bottom panel by removing 15 retention screws from the rear panel (Figure 3-1) and the bottom panel (Figure 3-2).

**Step 2:** To prevent the internal SATA cable from damage, please open the bottom panel as shown below.




Figure 3-4: HDD Bracket Retention Screws

**Step 3:** Remove the four HDD bracket retention screws (**Figure 3-4**) and lift the HDD brackets out of the TANK-GM45.




Figure 3-5: HDD Retention Screws

Step 4: Attach the HDD bracket to the HDD. Slide the HDD to connect the HDD to the SATA connector. Secure the HDD with the HDD bracket by four retention screws (Figure 3-5).

**Step 5:** Install the HDD bracket in the same position it was before.



Figure 3-6: HDD Installation


Step 6: Reinstall the bottom panel.

#### 3.3 Jumper Settings



#### NOTE:

A jumper is a metal bridge used to close an electrical circuit. It consists of two or three metal pins and a small metal clip (often protected by a plastic cover) that slides over the pins to connect them. To CLOSE/SHORT a jumper means connecting the pins of the jumper with



the plastic clip and to OPEN a jumper means removing the plastic clip from a jumper.

To access jumper, please remove the bottom panel (refer to **Section 3.2**), 12 motherboard retention screws and six front panel retention screws. The motherboard jumper is listed below.




Figure 3-7: Peripheral Connectors (Rear)

#### 3.4.1 LAN Connectors

CN Label: LAN1 and LAN2

CN Type: RJ-45

CN Location: See Figure 3-7

**CN Pinouts:** See **Table 3-4** 

The LAN connectors allow connection to an external network.

**Step 1:** Locate the RJ-45 connectors. The locations of the RJ-45 connectors are shown above.




Figure 3-8: LAN Connection

Step 2: Align the connectors. Align the RJ-45 connector on the LAN cable with one of the RJ-45 connectors on the TANK-GM45. See Figure 3-8.

Step 3: Insert the LAN cable RJ-45 connector. Once aligned, gently insert the LAN cable RJ-45 connector into the on-board RJ-45 connector.




Figure 3-10: PS/2 Keyboard/Mouse Connector




Figure 3-12: Remote Control Terminal Block Pinout Location



#### 3.4.5 RS-232 Serial Port Connector

CN Label: COM1

**CN Type:** DB-9 connectors

CN Location: See Figure 3-7

CN Pinouts: See Table 3-8 and Figure 3-14

RS-232 serial port devices can be attached to the DB-9 ports on the rear panel.

Step 1: Locate the DB-9 connector. The location of the DB-9 connector is shown in Figure 3-7.




Figure 3-13: Serial Device Connector

Step 2: Insert the serial connector. Insert the DB-9 connector of a serial device into the DB-9 connector on the external peripheral interface. See Figure 3-13.

**Step 3: Secure the connector**. Secure the serial device connector to the external interface by tightening the two retention screws on either side of the connector.




Figure 3-14: Serial Port Pinout Location




Figure 3-15: Serial Port Pinout Location




Figure 3-16: USB Device Connection

#### 3.4.8 VGA Connector

The VGA connector connects to a monitor that accepts VGA video input.

- Step 1: Locate the female DB-15 connector. The location of the female DB-15 connector is shown in Chapter 3.
- Step 2: Align the VGA connector. Align the male DB-15 connector on the VGA screen cable with the female DB-15 connector on the external peripheral interface.




Figure 3-17: VGA Connector

- Step 3: Insert the VGA connector Once the connectors are properly aligned with the insert the male connector from the VGA screen into the female connector on the TANK-GM45. See Figure 3-17.




Figure 3-18: VGA Connector

**BIOS** 

#### 4.1 Introduction

The BIOS is programmed onto the BIOS chip. The BIOS setup program allows changes to certain system settings. This chapter outlines the options that can be changed.

#### 4.1.1 Starting Setup

The AMI BIOS is activated when the computer is turned on. The setup program can be activated in one of two ways.

- 1. Press the **DELETE** key as soon as the system is turned on or
- 2. Press the **DELETE** key when the "**Press Del to enter SETUP**" message appears on the screen.

If the message disappears before the **DELETE** key is pressed, restart the computer and try again.

#### 4.1.2 Using Setup

Use the arrow keys to highlight items, press **ENTER** to select, use the PageUp and PageDown keys to change entries, press **F1** for help and press **Esc** to quit. Navigation keys are shown in.

#### 4.1.3 Getting Help

When **F1** is pressed a small help window describing the appropriate keys to use and the possible selections for the highlighted item appears. To exit the Help Window press **Esc** or the **F1** key again.

## 4.1.4 Unable to Reboot After Configuration Changes

If the computer cannot boot after changes to the system configuration is made, CMOS defaults. Use the jumper described in Chapter 2.

#### 4.1.5 BIOS Menu Bar

The **menu bar** on top of the BIOS screen has the following main items:

- Main Changes the basic system configuration.
- Advanced Changes the advanced system settings.
- PCIPnP Changes the advanced PCI/PnP Settings
- Boot Changes the system boot configuration.
- Security Sets User and Supervisor Passwords.
- Chipset Changes the chipset settings.
- Exit Selects exit options and loads default settings

The following sections completely describe the configuration options found in the menu items at the top of the BIOS screen and listed above.

## 4.2 Main

The **Main** BIOS menu (BIOS Menu 1) appears when the **BIOS Setup** program is entered. The **Main** menu gives an overview of the basic system information.

#### System Overview

The **System Overview** lists a brief summary of different system components. The fields in **System Overview** cannot be changed. The items shown in the system overview include:

- AMI BIOS: Displays auto-detected BIOS information
  - O Version: Current BIOS version
  - O Build Date: Date the current BIOS version was made
  - O ID: Installed BIOS ID
- Processor: Displays auto-detected CPU specifications
  - O **Type:** Names the currently installed processor
  - O Speed: Lists the processor speed
  - O Count: The number of CPUs on the motherboard
- System Memory: Displays the auto-detected system memory.
  - O Size: Lists memory size

The System Overview field also has two user configurable fields:

#### System Time [xx:xx:xx]

Use the **System Time** option to set the system time. Manually enter the hours, minutes and seconds.

#### System Date [xx/xx/xx]

Use the **System Date** option to set the system date. Manually enter the day, month and year.

Use the **Advanced** menu (BIOS Menu 2) to configure the CPU and peripheral devices through the following sub-menus:





Use the **Spread Spectrum** option to reduce the EMI. Excess EMI is generated when the system clock generator pulses have extreme values. Spreading the pulse spectrum modulates changes in the extreme values from spikes to flat curves, thus reducing the EMI. This benefit may in some cases be outweighed by problems with timing-critical devices, such as a clock-sensitive SCSI device.

# One Key Recovery

## A.1 One Key Recovery Introduction

The IEI one key recovery is an easy-to-use front end for the Norton Ghost system backup and recovery tool. The one key recovery provides quick and easy shortcuts for creating a backup and reverting to that backup or for reverting to the factory default settings.

To create the system backup the main storage device must be split into two partitions (three partitions for Linux). The first partition will be for the operating system, while the second partition will be invisible to the operating system and contain the backup made by the one key recovery software.

### A.1.1 System Requirement

The partition created for recovery images must be big enough to contain both the factory default image and the user backup image. The size must be calculated before creating the partitions. Please take the following table as a reference when calculating the size of the partition.

Specialized tools are required to change the partition size if the operating system is already installed.

The recovery CD can only be used with IEI products. The software will fail to run and a warning message will appear when used on non-IEI hardware.



## A.2 Initial Setup Procedure for Windows

Prior to using the recovery tool to backup or restore system, a few setup procedures are required.

- Step 1: Hardware and BIOS setup
- Step 2: Create partitions
- Step 3: Build-up recovery partition
- **Step 4:** Install operating system, drivers and system applications.
- Step 5: Create factory default image

The detailed descriptions are described in the following sections.



# NOTE:

The setup procedures described below are for Microsoft Windows operating system users. For Linux system, most setup procedures are the same with Microsoft Windows except for several steps which is described in **Section A.3**.

#### A.2.1 Hardware and BIOS Setup

- **Step 1:** Install a hard driver or SSD in the TANK-GM45. An unformatted and unpartitioned disk is recommended.
- Step 2: Connect an optical disk drive to the TANK-GM45 and insert the recovery CD.
- Step 3: Turn on the system.
- Step 4: Press the <DELETE> key as soon as the system is turned on to enter the BIOS.
- Step 5: Select the connected optical disk drive as the 1<sup>st</sup> boot device. (Boot → Boot
   Device Priority → 1<sup>st</sup> Boot Device).
- **Step 6:** Press F10 then "Y" to save changes and restart the computer. Continue to the next section for instructions on partitioning the internal storage.






Figure A-5: Build-up Recovery Partition




Figure A-7: Press F3 to Boot into Recovery Mode




Figure A-9: About Symantec Ghost Window




Figure A-10: Symantec Ghost Path




Figure A-12: Select a Source Partition from Basic Drive




Figure A-13: File Name to Copy Image to




Figure A-14: Compress Image




Figure A-15: Image Creation Confirmation




Figure A-16: Image Creation Complete




Figure A-17: Image Creation Complete




Figure A-19: Partitions for Linux






Figure A-24: Restore Factory Default




Figure A-26: Backup System




Figure A-28: Restore Backup




Figure A-30: Symantec Ghost Window

# **B.2.2 Cleaning Tools**

- Cloth Although paper towels or tissues can be used, a soft, clean piece of cloth is recommended when cleaning the TANK-GM45.
- Water or rubbing alcohol A cloth moistened with water or rubbing alcohol can be used to clean the TANK-GM45.
- Using solvents The use of solvents is not recommended when cleaning the TANK-GM45 as they may damage the plastic parts.
- Vacuum cleaner Using a vacuum specifically designed for computers is one of the best methods of cleaning the TANK-GM45. Dust and dirt can restrict the airflow in the TANK-GM45 and cause its circuitry to corrode.
- Cotton swabs Cotton swaps moistened with rubbing alcohol or water are excellent tools for wiping hard to reach areas.
- **Foam swabs** Whenever possible, it is best to use lint free swabs such as foam swabs for cleaning.
